WILD STATISTICS, Lessons in Acceleration [It came from the Internet, so it MUST be TRUE!!!] ....from Clarence Clark

One Top Fuel dragster 500 cu.in. Hemi engine makes more horsepower than the first 4 rows at the Daytona 500 [700 hp].

Under full throttle, a Top Fuel dragster engine consumes 4 liters of nitro-methane per second; a fully loaded 747 consumes jet fuel at the [same] rate with 25% LESS energy being produced.

A stock Dodge 426 Hemi V8 engine cannot produce enough power to drive the dragster's supercharger. With 3000 cfm of air being rammed in by the supercharger on overdrive, the fuel mixture is compressed into a near-solid form before ignition. Cylinders run on the verge of hydraulic lock at full throttle; at the stoichiometric 1.7:1 airfuel mix for nitro-methane, the flame front temp measures 7,050 degrees F. Nitro methane burns yellow; the spectacular white flame seen above the stacks at night is raw burning hydrogen, dissociated from atmospheric water vapor by the searing exhaust gases.

Dual maagnetos supply 44 amps to each spark plug. This is the output of an arc welder in each cylinder; spark plug electrodes are entirely consumed during a pass. After half way, the engine is dieseling from compression plus the glow of exhaust valves is 1400 degrees F. The engine can only be shut down by cutting the fuel flow. IF spark momentarily fails early in the run, unburned nitro builds up in the affected cylinders and then explodes with sufficient force to blow cylinder heads off the block in pieces or splits the block in half.

In order to exceed 300 mph in 4.5 seconds, dragsters must accelerate at an energy of over 4 G's. In order to reach 200 mph well before half-track, the launch acceleration approaches 8 G's. Dragsters reach over 300 mph BEFORE you have completed reading this sentence. Top Fuel engines turn approximately 540 revolutions while traveling a quarter of a mile! Including the burnout, the engine must survive about 900 revolutions under load; the red-line is actually quite high at 9500 rpm.

The Bottom Line: Assuming all the equipment is paid off, the crew worked for free, and for once Nothing Blows Up, each run costs an estimated \$1,000 per SECOND!

The current Top Fuel dragster elapsed time record is 4.441 seconds for the qtr mile [10/5/03-tony Schumacher]; the top speed record is 333mph, as measured over the last 66' of the run [9/28/03-Doug Kalitta].

Putting all this into perspective: You are riding the 'average' \$250,000 Honda MotoGP bike... Over a mile up the road, a Top Fuel dragster is staged and ready to launch down a quarter mile strip as you pass. [You have the advantage of a flying start.] YOU run the RC211V hard up through the gears and blast across the starting line and past the dragster at an honest 200 mph [293 ft./sec.] The "tree" goes green for both of you at that moment. The dragster launches and starts after you... You keep your wrist cranked hard, but you hear an incredibly brutal whine that sears your eardrums and within 3 seconds, the dragster catches and passes you. He beats you to the finish line, a quarter mile away from where you just passed him.

Think about it, from a standing start, the dragster had spotted you 200 mph and not only caught, but nearly blasted you off the road when he passed you, within a mere 1320 foot long race course.

THAT, folks, is ACCELERATION!!!!!

# Suddenly, it's 1964

Forty years after Studebaker halted its South Bend operations, billboards touting the "beautiful new '64 Studebaker" have been appearing in South Bend.

The 16 billboards scattered throughout the city are designed to promote the Studebaker National Museum but are based on those that did appear for the 1964 model year. The billboard were erected in February.

Museum Director Becky Bonham said reaction to the billboards has been very positive and has generated interest in the museum. Museum Curator Andy Beckman conceived of the campaign after he discovered in the Studebaker archives records of



Studebaker Corp.'s 1964 model year billboard campaign. He said billboards originally were placed in the top 100 markets across the country before Studebaker announced it was closing its South Bend operations.

Bonham said Burkhart

Advertising was able to reproduce the original billboards and donated all production costs to the Studebaker National Museum.

Bonham said one of the original billboards was preserved and is on display inside the museum.



• From the Orange Empire Chapter — Why are some engines are as clean as a whistle internally and others resemble the La Brea Tar Pits? The answer is the presence of water.

For every gallon of gasoline burned, two a half gallons of water are produced. If the engine is not fully warmed up before shutting down, water can get past piston rings and inside the engine, where it can coagulate with engine oil byproducts and carbon.

The solution is to fully warm the engine even for short trips down the block or in and out of the garage. The heat inside the combustion chamber will vaporize the water, which can be passed out through the tail pipe. When crankcase oil comes in contact with hot engine components, the water present is vaporized and passed out of the PCV system. Missing or malfunctioning thermostats can also affect engine temperature and lead to sludge buildup.

Good quality motor oil, frequent oil and filter changes as well as function thermostats and PCV systems also are key components.

#### GETTING HERE

We are at the Park Inn in Chippewa Falls, do not mistake for Park Inn in Eau Claire.

**From Chicago/Madison/Milwaukee** traveling N on I-94, exit #70 Eau Claire to Hwy 53 N and go 12 miles. At Hwy 53 N and WI 124 N intersection, stay with 124. Turn left on <u>second</u> "J" which is one mile N of Hwy 53/124 intersection. Go N on "J" for 2 blocks. Total time from Madison, WI, 3 hrs-15 minutes.

**From Minneapolis/St. Paul** traveling E on I-94. Take exit 59 toward WI 124 N and US 12 Eau Claire for 3 miles. WI 124 and US 12 split, bear left and follow Hwy 124 N for 4.25 miles. Merge onto US 53 N via the ramp on the left, toward WI 124 N. Follow 124/53 N for 2.25 miles. At Hwy 53 N and WI 124 N intersection, stay with 124. Turn left on second "J" which is one mile N of Hwy 53/124 intersection. Go N on "J" for 2 blocks. Total time, 1 hr-40 minutes.

**From Duluth, MN,** take Hwy 53 S to Eau Claire. Do not take the "S" or "Hwy 29" Chippewa Falls exits, take exit no. 92, Hwy 124 N. Turn left on "J" which is one mile N of Hwy 53/124 intersection. Go N on "J" for 2 blocks. Total time, 3 hrs.

**From Wausau, WI.** Take Hwy 29 west to Eau Claire/Chippewa Falls. Bear left onto Hwy 124 S. (toward Eau Claire). Go 1 mile and turn right onto "J". Go N on "J" for 2 blocks. Total time, 2 hrs-10 minutes.

**NOTE:** Visual Aid, Park Inn is located behind Country Inn, which has a large, tall, green sign on the west side of hwy 124.


